## **2023 ANNUAL BUDGET**BREAK DOWN

The Ozark Police Department relies predominantly on the City of Ozark's general fund for its funding. This essential fund is sustained by local taxes, permits, fees, fines, and various other revenue sources. Additionally, the department secures support from state and federal grants tailored to bolster specific programs and initiatives. This year, our total budget stands at \$5,081,479.92, allocated as follows: \$3,411,608.82 for personnel, \$751,246.10 for new equipment, \$125,000.00 for IT licenses, and \$793,625.00 for operational expenses.










2 % of traffic stops conducted by the Ozark Police Department were on County Roads or Private Property.


\*Ozark Police Department provides services 24 hours a day, seven(7) days a week, and 365 days a year.




### SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

#### CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION UNIT

The Criminal Investigation Unit is tasked with investigating crimes against individuals and property, primarily focusing on the most severe crimes reported to the Ozark Police Department. The Detectives also provide support to the Field Services Division in terms of crime scene processing, criminal intelligence evaluation, and other cases such as missing person investigations. 2023 Total Felony Cases Assigned to Detectives: 170

#### **K9 UNIT**

The Ozark Police Department is staffed with two Police Service Dog teams specializing in narcotics detection, apprehension, tracking, and article recovery. K9 Ollie is partnered with Officer Jeremy Watson, and K9 Dex is partnered with Officer Tanner Gilmore. In 2023, OPD K9 teams had 265 deployments, resulting in 216 outcomes.

#### Unmanned Aircraft Systems(UAS) Drone Unit

Ozark Police Department's Unmanned Aerial System The Drone Unit was deployed 38 times this year (Drone) Unit provides an innovative and enhanced for: resource to assist the department in its mission to protect lives and property. The UAS/ Drone Unit consists of two (2) FAA-licensed operators who provide specialized imaging and viewing during police incidents. The UAS/ Drone Unit is deployed in situations such as missing persons investigations, high-risk operations, crime scene investigations, evidence recovery operations, and traffic impact analysis. The UAS/ Drone Unit is prohibited from operating where an individual would have an expectation of privacy, from conducting routine surveillance, or from conducting traffic enforcement operations.



## **TRAFFIC**ENFORCEMENT

The Ozark Police Department's Traffic Enforcement Unit is a component of the Special Operations Division. The goal of this specialized group of police officers is to enhance roadway safety within Ozark, focusing on investigating and preventing motor vehicle crashes, identifying and addressing traffic hazards, planning for traffic impacts, proactively identifying impaired drivers, and enforcing traffic laws.



The Support Services Division of the Ozark Police Department plays a crucial role in ensuring the efficiency and effectiveness of various essential functions within the department. Overseeing key units such as the Canine Control Unit, Training Unit, and Records Unit/Property & Evidence, this division coordinates vital aspects of law enforcement operations.

#### TRAINING UNIT

The Ozark Police Department's Training Unit is committed to obtaining the best possible continuing education and training for our personnel. Ozark Police Officers received 3,560 hours of training in 2023. Corporal Kyle Prince is responsible for the oversight, implementation and management of the department's training efforts.



#### RECORDS UNIT | PROPERTY & EVIDENCE

The Records Unit provides customer service to citizens conducting business at the Ozark Police Department. Clerks of the Records Unit are responsible for all reports generated by the Ozark Police Department and are the central repository for all police documents. These documents include citations, offense reports, vehicular accident reports, tow reports, and additional reports completed by patrol and investigative officers. Clerks provide administrative support to sworn staff and play a vital role in compiling and reporting statistical data to State and Federal record information databases. The Property & Evidence Unit is responsible for maintaining the integrity and safe custody of all evidentiary items and property submitted by the Ozark Police Department. The Records Unit and Property & Evidence Unit consist of a Support Services Supervisor, three (3) Police Clerks, and one (1) Evidence Technician.

#### **CANINE CONTROL UNIT**

The Ozark Canine Control officer is responsible for enforcing local animal control laws and regulations. Our Canine Control Officer is tasked with responding to reports of stray or dangerous dogs, investigating cases of animal cruelty, and ensuring that pet owners comply with licensing and vaccination requirements. Our canine control officer receives ongoing training and is certified by the National Animal Control Association. If you have lost your canine, you must provide proof of ownership, current rabies vaccination, and a city pet license to claim or pick up your dog.



Ozark's Canine Control officer has a strong understanding of animal behavior and safety procedures, as well as excellent communication and customer service skills. Canine Control works closely with local shelters and rescue organizations to help place animals needing homes.

Overall, Ozark's Canine Control officer plays a vital role in protecting both animals and the community at large. Ozark Canine Control is not licensed to adopt, so please only contact our office for release if you are the animal's owner or know the animal's owner. Our Canine Control Facility is licensed through the Missouri Department of Agriculture.






## **WOMEN'S SELF-DEFENSE**COURSE
